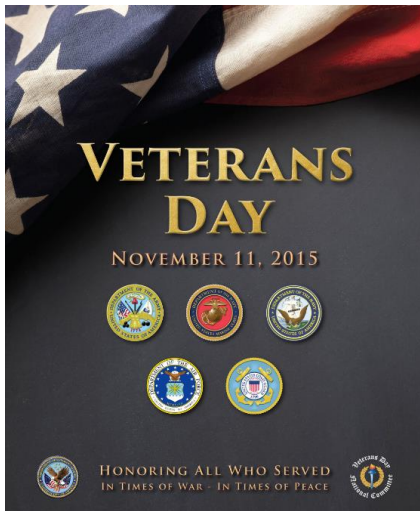

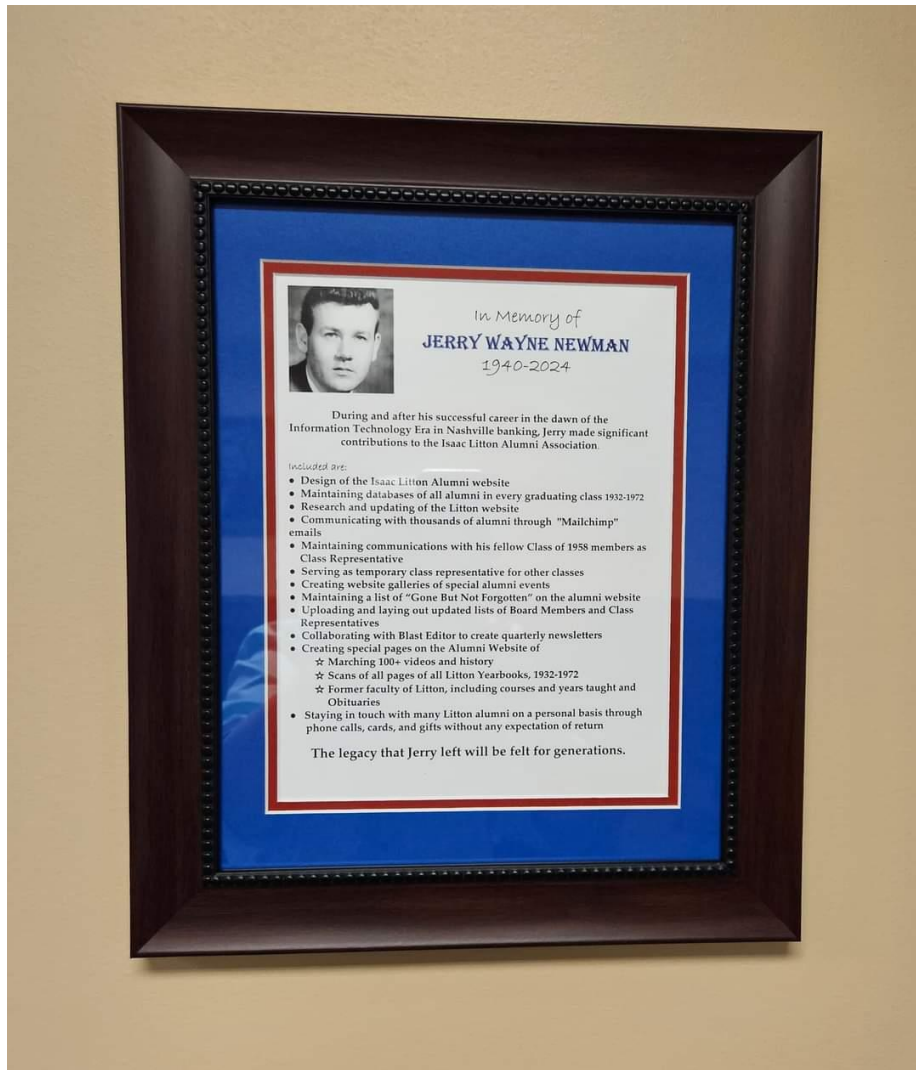

SPOTLIGHT ON ALUMNI: BARBARA WOOD NOVOVICH, CLASS OF '54

Barbara Wood Bright Novovitch (Germany, Sweden, Bulgaria, Ireland, Pakistan, England, 1968 – 1970), a journalist for major news publications who helped open the profession to women, died September 1, 2022, of heart failure, her husband Luc Novovitch said.



Barbara was a staff writer at *The Washington Post*, *Newsweek* and Reuters, with foreign postings in Germany, Hong Kong, London and Paris. She was a founding editor of *Woman's World* weekly magazine.



Fresh from her ICWA fellowship following student protest movements across Europe and Pakistan in the early 1970s, Barbara joined a sexual discrimination class action lawsuit brought against her new employer, *Newsweek*. Her role is documented in the book [*Good Girls Revolt*](#), later developed into an Amazon Prime television series.

On her fellowship, Barbara reported about student protests that rocked late 1960s establishments, including in Czechoslovakia, where she visited Charles University soon after the 1969 Soviet invasion had put down the Prague Spring.

The death of the student Jan Palach from self-immolation—which prompted parallels with the medieval martyr Jan Hus—had shocked and depressed Czechoslovaks, as Barbara described. Still, she saw strength in the students' tactics despite the seemingly iron resolve of the country's occupiers.



“The student movement in Czechoslovakia is ideologically more diffuse but popularly more firmly rooted than that of West Germany or of the United States,” she wrote. “By going to the factories and explaining to the workers the reasons behind their strikes and protests, the students have won a common basis.”

ICWA was important to Barbara at a time “when women were not given the support or respect necessary to grow and succeed in the profession,” her daughter Elizabeth Bright said. “She loved reporting, and the years she traveled to

different places in Europe to get *the story* were probably her happiest,” she added. Barbara “was intrepid and proud of her ability to get all kinds of people to tell their stories. She was able to see issues objectively, which is essential to good journalism.”

Barbara continued her involvement with the institute and advising fellows after her fellowship.

A native Tennessean, she loved both Bluegrass and Country music. She performed frequently, singing and playing various stringed instruments with bands that included other journalists.

Barbara married the photojournalist Luc Novovitch in 1989. They moved to the town of Marathon in west Texas, where they launched the *Marathon Gazette* in 2000. The Dallas Press Club honored the monthly paper as an awards finalist for best community/neighborhood newspaper. After they sold the publication, it became *The Big Bend Gazette*, current publisher Mimi Smith said.

Barbara devoted “tremendous time, skill and inspiration to the region,” Smith told the institute, “from training up volunteer naturalists to show off the region’s mountain treasures, a tiny digital start-up in furious reaction to bad local journalism, and writing occasional features for a slick seasonal publication dedicated to the natural wonders of the Big Bend.”

MUSIC CITY, USA

In the 1950s whenever relatives came to visit, my folks would take them to the Grand Ole Opry downtown to see the musicians there and hear their wonderful music. As the years passed, the popularity and diversity of this music grew so much that Nashville earned the title of Music City, USA, and its music became famous world-wide. But did you know that many Isaac Litton High School graduates had a strong influence in causing this popularity? Listed here are several (but certainly not all) of these students.



Almost everyone interested in the music field has heard of Harold Bradley, a Hall of Fame guitarist who recorded with Elvis Presley, Buddy Holly, Ernest Tubb, Hank Williams, Perry Como, Conway Twitty, Alan Jackson and many other famous artists. He was a member of the A Team of 12 highly respected musicians who did the bulk of

Nashville recordings for over 30 years. Over his career he received many awards, including country music's highest honor, induction into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2006 and became famous nationally. Harold was a 1944 Litton graduate.

John Benson, who graduated in 1946, had much influence in the Gospel Music Hall of Fame into which he was inducted in 2006. He had a long and successful career in the gospel music industry and was president of the John T. Benson Publishing Company for many years.





Aubrey (Audie) Ashworth, class of 1954, touched the lives of many aspiring musicians by encouraging those interested in a musical career. He published many hit songs, including “The Gambler,” the Song of the Year, in 1979. He began his radio career at WKSR in Pulaski, TN, and later became one of the WKDA “Good Guys” in Nashville, where he held the distinction of capturing the highest individual ratings ever accorded a Nashville radio personality. He directed placement of material written by Ferlin Husky, Eddie Arnold, Kris Kristofferson, Bill Anderson and others, and was credited as music director of three country music-oriented motion pictures.

James (Buzz) Cason graduated from Litton in 1957. Buzz got his start in the music business in 1956 when hanging out at WSIX, a local TV station where Noel Ball hosted the “Saturday Showcase” program. He wrote his first song---



“My Love Song for You”—in 1957 and at age 16, Buzz became a member of “The Casuals” which was a backing band for Brenda Lee. In 1962 Buzz was in LA where he and an associate produced the Crickets in a version of “La Bamba” and he later filled in as a singer with that group. He started his Creative Workshop publishing company and over the next decades he became Jimmy Buffet’s publisher, as well as publishing the works of Brenda Lee, Roy Orbison, Emmylou Harris, Jerry Reed, Kenny Rogers, John Denver and other notable artists. He was also honored by the Country Music Hall of Fame and received many other awards.

These are just a few of Litton graduates who had a deep impact on the development of the music industry in Nashville, this country and the world. Aren’t you glad you share a connection with such talent?

Postscript: While not directly involved with the music industry, several Litton alumni had parents who were, such as Gwendolyn Hill, class of 1959, and Eddie Hill, class of 1964, whose dad was Smiling Eddie Hill, a musician, songwriter, Country Music Disc Jockey Hall of Fame inductee, and DJ for "Country Junction" on WSM radio in Nashville.

From Vicki Hall Neal, class of 1966: Of course it has to be Mr. Swor. I have never seen a teacher be able to get what he did out of a bunch of teenagers. I believe we would have done anything he asked of us - and we certainly did. On top of that he made us proud, and our self-esteem was through the roof. Kids today should have that feeling of accomplishment.

From Bob n Ann Smith, Class of 1960: I can add to Mr. Swor: when we entered the band room, rambunctious and rowdy, he was usually sitting at his desk in the back, engaging with students. BUT, if he was on his seat up front with baton in hand, we all knew he had one of his migraines. We quietly got our instruments out, sat down and waited for “class” to begin. I could not play a note or even read music when I signed up for band in the 7th grade (so as not to have to take gym). Mr. Swor somehow imparted these two skills that I still have today. I might not use them, but I have them.

I also have Mr. Arthritis in my left hip from all the marching practices.

Norma Sullivan Jeroutek, class of 1958: Yes, Mr Swor would have to be my favorite teacher at Litton. Not only did he run a “tight ship,” but he also instilled so many wonderful traits in us as teenagers.

I remember one day in the band room, as we were all in our seats playing a song (Mr Swor was on his podium and I played the flute on the first row), all of a sudden, with baton in hand, he motioned for us to stop playing. He looked down AT ME, with that look only he could give. He leaned forward, thrusting his hand with the baton at me, and shook it. All of a sudden, I realized I had gum in my mouth (which was a no-no). I took the gum out of my mouth looking at him, and he leaned a little further toward me, waving the end of the baton. I couldn’t believe I actually put my gum on the end of that baton. He raised his hands (gum on baton) and indicated for us to continue. I have never been so embarrassed, but you know what? I never entered that band room again with gum in my mouth!! I loved you, Mr. Swor!!

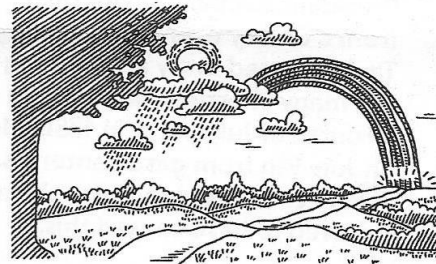


