Isaac Litton Descendent Scholarship

Recipients for 2026

The ILAA Scholarship Committee was established in 2025, under the direction of the ILAA Board. The committee is composed of a diverse group of alumni: Judy Cline, Sammy Swor, Buddy Jones, Franklin Davis and Rita Solomon. Descendents of ILHS are eligible to apply and this year we had an extensive group of accomplished applicants from which to choose. We evaluated applicants based on academic achievement and honors/AP classes, extracurricular activities, finances, and an approximately 500 word essay describing themselves. We used this information with a rubric to score the applicants in an objective manner and then chose the top three to interview. The interview process was conducted to assess areas such as effectiveness, collaboration, problem solving, leadership opportunities and time management. The Board approved the top three applicants to receive a scholarship for 2026.

The Committee chose **Evelyn Michelle (Evie) Neuhaus** of Cincinnati, OH as the \$2000 scholarship recipient for 2026. She is the granddaughter of Victor Taylor, class of 1970. Her essay indicates someone who is accustomed to adversity and overcoming it. She has been attending Oak Hills High School with a GPA of 4.897.

As a baby, she was abandoned in Wenzhou, China. With no relatives, she was taken to an orphanage where she remained until her new family adopted her at the age of two. She is involved in volunteer projects

such as traveling to Honduras on a trip where they build houses, deliver food, and run a clothing drive. She has also enjoyed working at a local church's Wednesday night community meals, serving hot meals and providing groceries to people who are hungry. In addition, she works in the math and writing labs at her high school. She volunteers at other school and community projects and has earned the Community Impact Award from ServeOhio and the State of Ohio House of Representatives.

Her academic life reflects a dedicated student who has also been able to work part time. As part of the *top 5%* of her class, she has won the Governor's Scholarship to help with college expenses. She has also worked as a server at a country club for about twenty hours a week beginning in March of 2025, which has developed her interpersonal skills and leadership as she trained new hires. Before working at the country club, she worked as a server at a small family restaurant (August 2023-February 2025).

She plans to attend The Ohio State University and major in civil engineering. With a degree in civil engineering, she hopes to provide for her family while joining an association like Engineers Without Borders to help vulnerable populations both in the community and abroad to meet basic human needs. As a former orphan who didn't always have access to those basic needs, giving back in that way is her life goal.

The ILAA Scholarship Committee chose **Jett Greer Gritzenbach** of Murfreesboro, as a \$1000 scholarship recipient for 2026. Jett is the grandson of Deborah Baldwin Greer, class of 1970. He has been attending Providence Christian Academy with a cumulative GPA of 4.13 and multiple honors and dual enrollment classes.

He has been involved in school, soccer, and work, and learned to take responsibility for himself, which has helped him grow both academically and personally. Outside of classrooms and assignments, soccer and his job with the family

marketing business have been most influential. Soccer team experience has taught him lifelong lessons regarding accountability, discipline, and pursuing goals.

These experiences taught him to become independent, self-reliant and capable of managing life's challenges on his own. He learned to navigate responsibilities such as time management, organization and decision making with little assistance.

One example of his independence is his ability to manage his own finances. Recently when his car broke down, he secured and paid for a new vehicle. Challenges involving transportation, finances and personal responsibility have shaped his character and prepared him for future success in both college and his career. Above all, they have taught him the value of accountability which he believes will help him remain humble, honest and dependable throughout life.

His career goal is to pursue live production, more specifically, lighting and visual design for concerts and large-scale events which involves a blend of creativity and technical skill. He will serve as audiovisual intern this summer at a church and attend Middle Tennessee State University in the fall due to its incredibly strong audio and visual program, as well as its Scott Borchetta College of Media and Entertainment.

The ILAA Scholarship Committee chose **Reilly Sitler** of Gallatin as a \$1000 scholarship recipient for 2026. Reilly is the granddaughter of Donna Gorman Craig, class of 1966. She has finished her second year at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville in the Bachelor of Arts Program with a degree in English and a cumulative GPA of 4.0.

In her essay, she used the analogy of a recent volunteer project which involved searching for the perfect stones at an unappealing puddle in the middle of an

older community cemetery. She enhanced the undisturbed puddle with stone placement to create a mosaic and intention. She hopes to build her life stone by stone, transforming it into something intentional. As a second-year student, at the University of Tennessee, she has had numerous opportunities to transform herself. This past year, she was given the opportunity to join a sorority, to work as a copy-editor at the Daily Beacon, to join leadership in her pre-law fraternity. She has been able to foster her love for English and writing in her major-specific classes. She hopes to become a highly skilled writer, enabling her to pursue a law degree. Law as a profession requires eloquent yet succinct writing. An English degree with a concentration in rhetoric will help with her admission to law school and allow her to excel in her journey as an attorney. Along with these educational aspirations come professional aspirations in the legal field. Once she graduates from law school, she hopes to specialize in appellate law. Appellate law involves representing clients in higher courts, such as the Tennessee Supreme Court, when a decision by lower courts is being reversed or affirmed. Her goal is to represent people who have faced injustice in what is meant to be the justice system. Think wrongfully convicted people on death row. Think of the book *Just Mercy* by Bryan Stevenson, a book that inspired her to take this career path. Wrongfully convicted people are the people whose lives she wants to transform. She plans to spend her life trying to place each stone, trying to intentionally transform herself into better versions. She will spend her life trying to help others place their stones, helping them transform their lives for the better. She is aware she may not always see the completion of these transformations in others, but she can still help them place stones in hopes that one day, their lives will be transformed.

ROSIE THE RIVETER!

Marie Labato Kincaid Dingle was born in 1924 and is 102 years old.

She was born and raised on a cattle ranch in New Mexico. After high school, she wanted to see the world. She wanted to help in the war effort in WWII. She made her first train trip ever from Salt Lake City, Utah, to Washington State, to Seattle where her sister was working. She went to work for Boeing Aircraft as a bucker and



soon became a Riveter. They lived in a boarding house with family until Boeing built a dormitory for the ladies a year later. She worked on the B17 B25 Aircraft. On Saturdays, the USO held dances for the girls and soldiers. She loved



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dance, so she went often. She met her husband, James Carroll Kincaid there. When his ship left for the Pacific, they wrote letters for a great while. He asked her to marry when he returned. His ship was sunk and he was rescued after 21 hours in the water. They married in Seattle. After the war ended, they traveled to New Mexico and returned to Nashville to live. Because of so many returning soldiers with wives, housing was scarce. They lived in a government apartment center called Separation Center located in the 100 Oaks area. He had lived in Inglewood and wanted to be close. Their first house was in Madison, but they soon moved to Inglewood on Greenland Avenue, the Litton Zone, with their three girls, Kitty, Patsy, and Barbara. All

became Litton graduates, just like their dad! She worked as a nurse at Baptist Hospital, retiring after 30 years.

When asked, she said that their dad loved Litton and left with other classmates to join the Navy after Pearl Harbor.

She was proud to be a Litton Mom. Selling lots of fruitcakes during Barbara's band years was a good memory. She is proud to be a "Rosie", and it was hard work, but she didn't mind. She helped win the war!

She has been honored at several events, including Gary Senese's Memorial Day Honors in Washington, DC, and at the World War II Museum in New Orleans. Her three Litton daughters are official "Rosebuds."

As we think about our American history and our America's 250th Birthday, isn't it great that we have our own "Rosie the Riveter".

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

John Younger graduated from Isaac Litton High School in 1953. He taught math for three years at Litton and was the beloved class sponsor for the class of 1965. He was head

basketball coach in '63,'64 and '65. He was also an assistant football coach

John Younger's thirty-year career in education caused him to rise to the top of his profession both in the public and private school systems.

John Younger is well respected by his peers and former students as a master educator. Younger earned a B.S. degree from Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) and a Master's of Mathematics and Educational Administration from George Peabody College. He was the Chairman of the Board of the Tennessee Teachers Credit Union and also chaired the Personnel Committee at Christ Episcopal Church.

Mr. Younger taught mathematics at both Hillsboro and Isaac Litton High Schools, as well as coaching football, basketball and track.

His move to the administrative level came in 1965, when he was named assistant principal for Highland Heights Junior High School. In 1967 he became principal at Bellevue High School overseeing more than 750 seventh through twelfth grade students.

Due to his outstanding performances, Younger was recruited for the "central office" at Metro Schools, where he initially served as Supervisor of Mathematics. In this position, he developed the math curriculum, selected textbooks, assigned teachers, and coordinated staff development for the entire Metro School System.

Continuing with Metro Schools, Younger was named Director of Employer Relations, where he negotiated for all employees in the school system, developed personnel policies, and resolved grievances. In 1978, Younger became the Assistant Superintendent for Business Services where he was responsible for all business and financial activities of Metro Schools.

Again climbing in Metro Schools, he was named Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Services, accountable for school programs involving 67,000 students before retiring from the public school system. However, Younger returned to education when approached by the

Board of Trustees at FRA in 1994 to become the Director of Business and Finance. Soon after making the transition to Franklin Road Academy (FRA) he was asked to spearhead an effort to construct a new middle school and fine arts center.

Further, he has been active in civic and community organizations, serving on the boards of the PENCIL Foundation, the American Heart Association, the East Nashville YMCA, and the Old Hickory Country Club.

Additionally, he is past president of the Tennessee Association of School Business Officials.

John Younger has been recognized for his outstanding contributions to the educational field numerous times by his peers. These awards include: Tennessee's Outstanding Achievement Award from Governor Ned Ray McWherter in 1992; Educational Administrator of the Year for Metropolitan Nashville Schools; Distinguished Service Award and Life Membership Award from the Tennessee Association of School Business Officials; and Distinguished Member Award from the Southeastern Association of School Business Officials.

Although John Younger is a man of stature in the community, he has never been too busy to stop and listen to students or serve those around him. His life is a true success story--one of joy, humility, faith, friendship, and truth.

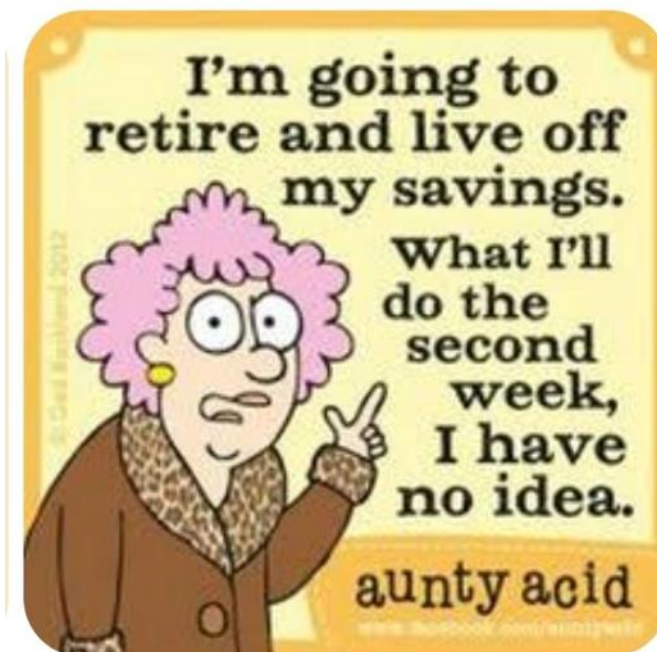
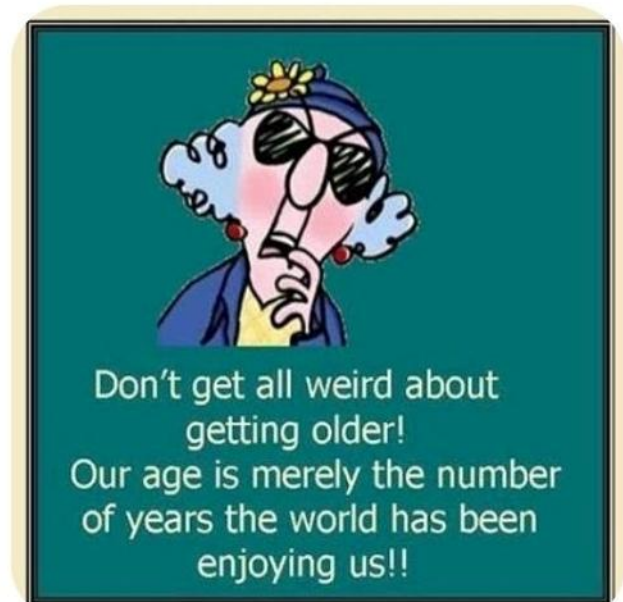

The website has been redesigned and updated by Debbi Rigdon of Virtual Goldmine. The website includes all the components that it had when Jerry Newman was our webmaster. Just a side note: I speak regularly with Debbi and have recently met her in person when she visited Mickey and Pat Collier (she is originally from Hendersonville, but now lives in Jacksonville, FL. Until then, you can still access those photos in the event there could be some that you would like to download.
3. **News and events:** Here you will see information on upcoming events, download registration forms, access the current and past issues of the Blast, and the process to reserve this Lions Hall for your own use.

Aside from these particularly useful sections, there is quite a bit of history and information about the school.

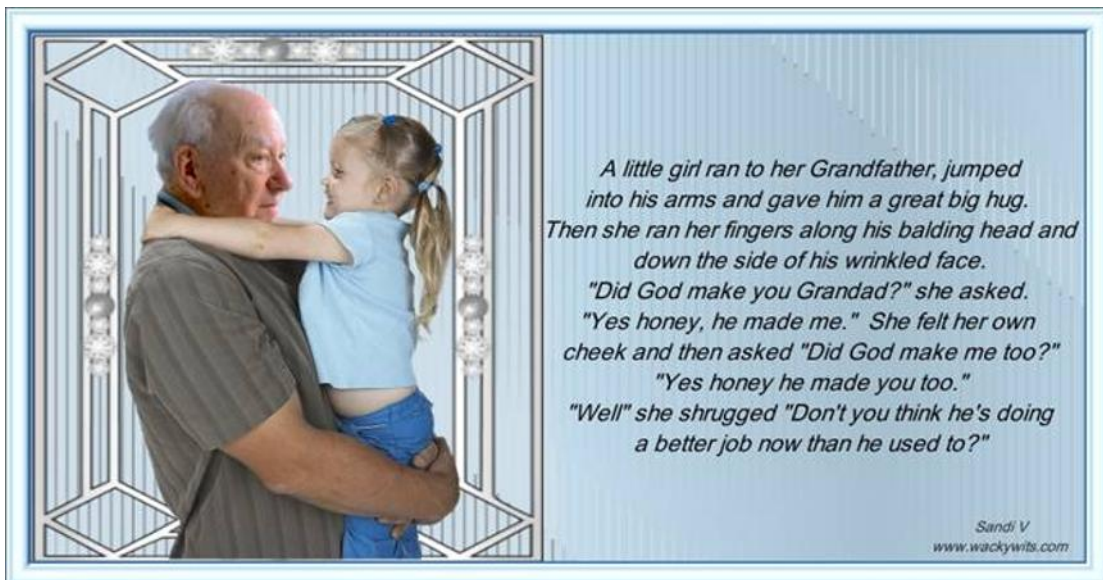
It is a great tool for staying in the know, and I hope that you will take advantage of it.

Since day one of leading Backfield in Motion, my mission has been to put our students in places and opportunities they may not have been able to be in normally. So, with that being said, I cannot say enough about the many partnerships we have with companies, foundations, and people throughout the city who are driven by that same mission.

Our students, this past school year, were involved in a program called The Future is Now, which is conducted through Vanderbilt Medical. This program has taught our kids several of the basic skills about what it takes to enter and be involved in the medical field (notice they are working on actual people). I am so proud of how our kids have excelled in this program and am very thankful to Vanderbilt Medical for giving our kids an intro to this career path.

We welcome any and all others who want to pour their career path engagements into our students as well!!



During the summer, our students engaged in our “Summer Academy! Students attended two College and Career Readiness seminars hosted by executives from MARS Petcare, where they learned about careers in sales, marketing, and negotiation strategies. They also visited Kennie's Playhouse Theatre, where they studied monologues and were introduced to important performing arts skills such as voice tone, projection, and pitch.

Students also participated in our Academy Rotations, which provided opportunities to strengthen their reading, writing, and text annotation skills through the study of poems and monologues. Students were introduced to the Engineering Design Process by designing and testing paper airplanes to determine which designs could fly the farthest.

In addition, students explored emerging technology through lessons on Artificial Intelligence (AI) and hands-on experiences using VR Oculus headsets. All students participated in our Health and Wellness Academy and Holistic Mentoring Groups, which focused on personal growth, leadership, and social-emotional development.

Students participated in several educational and cultural field experiences, including visits to MARS Petcare, Fisk University, News Channel 5, and Memphis, Tennessee. These experiences provided students with valuable real-world connections to the concepts and skills they have learned throughout the

Summer Academy.
